# The Bridge is Officially Open



This is the last article relating to the new bridge but we were delighted that, after years of planning and months of construction, the Memorial Bridge was officially opened on Monday 28th September by Chairman of the Governors Francis Abbott and Lady Emily Dacre. We were also joined by special guest, broadcaster and former Member of Parliament, Michael Portillo.

Mr Portillo was Minister of State for Transport at the time of the Clapham rail disaster in 1988 which claimed the lives of 35 people and is why the Memorial Bridge is so named. Many boys and staff assisted at the time of the crash and Mr Portillo spoke movingly of his memories of that day as well as speaking about his TV career and answering questions from the floor on such

# Work has started on the New Dacre Building



Buxton Building Contractors Limited (the same Main Contractor used for the Fiennes Theatre) started on site on 3 August 2015 and at the date of writing "old

Dacre" has been demolished and piling of the foundations for the new structure is nearing completion. The design, by Horsley Huber Architects, is a threestorey fifteen-classroom block which includes the complete renovation of the existing 4 art classrooms on the north side of the existing building. The project has a two-year duration, with completion of Phase 1 (new build) anticipated in December 2016 and Phase 2 (renovation) in the Summer of 2017. The end result will be four large, specialist art classrooms, two economics, four history, three geography and one learning support classroom as well as a film studio and various music practice rooms, offices, a lift and washroom facilities.

# **Major Rowing Medal Donation**



We recently received an incredibly generous and valuable donation to the School Archive from Dr Iain Reid (OE1967). Iain rowed for Emanuel in the 1960s in what is widely regarded as the finest Emanuel rowing crew of all time. Their greatest triumph was winning the Princess Elizabeth Challenge Cup, the blue-ribbon race on the final Sunday at Henley and were

the only crew to defeat overseas opposition in their final that year. Of course, this triumph is well documented in Emanuel School history and the crew were honoured again at Henley in 2008 when they had a 40th anniversary row past and there are rumours of a 50th anniversary row-past in the offing! Iain's crew also won the Schools' Head for the fourth time in five years as well as many other major regattas. In the adult Head of the River race the same crew finished 6<sup>th</sup>, the highest place ever for a school crew until 2009. Iain has very

## **Archive Matters**

#### "The Tall Man" or the Emanuel School Ghost

The development of the School Drive in 2014 and 2015 has led to the most radical geographical reconstruction of the entrance of the School since Emanuel relocated to Wandsworth in 1883 and this has a major bearing in any discussion about the Emanuel School ghost as the building work has made it difficult to pinpoint the exact spot where the ghost usually appeared. An issue of the Portcullis published in 1954 makes a full reference to the 'Emanuel School Ghost' which has also been referred to as 'The Tall Man' on numerous occasions. The ghost appears sporadically in the School history, but his guise seemed to change with different generations. An Old Boy, who attended Emanuel during the First World War, notes that "When you next go down the Drive from the School to the Gates, count the trees carefully on your left, and just past the fourth of those that are in a straight line (the first is opposite the road to the cobbleyard) [now the road that leads towards the Common Room and Year 8 playground] you will notice a slight depression in the ground. It was here that the Tall Man used to appear". The Tall Man appears on all school maps dating from 1935 until the mid 1970s, however, by that time you would struggle to find a boy who had even heard of the ghost never mind claim to have seen him. Sadly because of the passage of time and the changes in geography it is impossible to use the map accurately to locate the exact spot.

# Ragian House award returns to Emanuel after nearly 60 years

During one of my
Historical Walking Tours of



Emanuel School last
Friday I had the pleasure
of meeting Stephen Dix
(OE1962). Stephen was
donating a trophy given to
him in the First Form
(now Year 7) by his then
form teacher Miss Polly
Bedford. He had fond
memories of the teacher
who worked at Emanuel
for her entire career and
was very popular with the
younger boys. Because of

a list of names engraved on the trophy from the 1930s we concluded that the trophy was awarded to the Captains of Raglan House. Until 1948 Emanuel had a prep-school for pupils as young as eight years old, all of which were in Raglan House. Ms Bedford was in charge of this younger group of boys. One assumes that when Emanuel was evacuated to Petersfield the trophy remained in Battersea and so no further names were added. Once the Prep ended in 1948 Raglan House was disbanded and Ms Bedford probably recycled the trophy as a class prize which was eventually handed down to Stephen. It's a lovely item to have returned to the school after so many years, especially since Stephen has kept it in such splendid condition. *TRJ* 

# **School Sport Update**



The frenzy of interest surrounding a home **Rugby** World Cup certainly had all the Emanuel School rugby squads raring to go on their return in September and with it a new rugby season.

As I write this in the third week of November the 1<sup>st</sup> XV have won six out of their ten fixtures. This included a 36-22 win over Dulwich College 2<sup>nd</sup> XV, a 47-0 thrashing of Royal Alexandra and Albert School and most recently a 14-0 win over Sutton Valence School, which saw the team retain the Abbott Cup for the third year in a row, which has been competed for by the two sides as part of the United Westminster Schools Partnership since 1967 (as pictured).

The 2<sup>nd</sup> XV have won three from seven games, with an initial great win against City of London Freemans by 30-15 and then a fantastic display of running rugby against Latymer Upper School to come away victorious by a margin of 24- points to 8.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> XV have won four out of six of their games, with a hard fought 15-11 win against a tough Caterham School outfit. Just the other week in wet muddy conditions in Kent, they took on and beat Sutton Valence School by a score of 15 points to 7.

The Under 15A team have made huge strides forward with their campaign this year compared to last year with no fewer than 7 wins from 12 games. After a slow start to the season they have now won their last 5 out of 6 games, which have included a huge 42-5 win over Worth School and a dramatic 17-7 victory over a strong Wallington County Grammar School team. As I write this they are still in the Vase competition of the Natwest National Cup Competition, playing their 4<sup>th</sup> Round game next week.

#### Rowing

With Ali Elliott stepping down as Director of Rowing after a number of successful years in charge, this season was always going to be an interesting one to see if we could maintain the progress made, particularly in Girls rowing which has moved from strength to strength in recent times.

With newly appointed coaches Hannah Blaikie, Mark Roberts, Abby Johnston, and Nick Buckle, bringing in fresh ideas and experience, we have had a promising start to the season. At Bedford Small Boats Head in October, the J15 Girls finished equal 1<sup>st</sup> with Putney High in the coxed quads and took the top 3 places in the singles. At Kingston Small Boats Head a few weeks later our top quad finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in a strong field of nine boats.

The senior girls have also continued to impress following their successful season last year, with a 4<sup>th</sup> place out of 25 in WJ18 doubles at the Pairs Head and 4<sup>th</sup> out of 16 in WJ18 coxed fours at the Fours Head. Darcy Jennings who missed out on both these events due to illness, is aiming to gain GB representation this year.

Although a quieter start to the year on the boy's side, the hard work in training is starting to pay off and with the strengthening of squads from rugby next term, prospects look good at both J16 and J18 levels this season.
