For the past few Saturday mornings, 32 Year 5 primary school children from our local partner primary schools have come to Emanuel to participate in the Ascent programme.

Ascent is for children from disadvantaged backgrounds who are failing to meet national standards in the core subjects of literacy and maths. Developed in collaboration with staff at our partner schools, Ascent aims to enable pupils to catch up on vital work they have missed through lockdowns and then to solidify their basic knowledge and skills and build their confidence.

Taught by Emanuel staff and supported by an enthusiastic cohort of Sixth Form and Year 10 volunteers, each Saturday morning is comprised of booster curriculum-linked sessions in mathematics and literacy supplemented by interactive, fun hands-on

science sessions and co-curricular lessons (Drama, Art and Sport).

Olympic hopeful, Niclas Baker (OE2006-11)



Niclas Baker (OE2006-2011) won silver in the 400m at the British Championships in 2020, missing out on gold by less than 2 tenths of a second. This achievement is all the more notable for the fact that, due to the lockdown, Niclas persevered without his coach and at times any training partners, making use of any suitable outdoor facilities he could find. He has also combined training with working for the NHS for the past few years. Now, despite the huge challenges to his training and preparation caused by the pandemic and without funding, Niclas has his sights firmly set on the Toyko Olympics.

"I knew I wanted to be an athlete at the start of year 11 after making the semi-finals for the 100m hurdles at English Schools the summer before. Reaching the Olympics was always the goal, but I have learnt not

to look at such a macro goal as it will seem impossible to achieve and can become demotivating.

My athletics career started when I was discovered by OE Jonas Tawiah-Dodoo, who is now one of the top coaches in the UK. He saw me competing in the hurdles and high jump at a Wandsworth Schools competition. He picked me up and I trained with him for a year in Battersea. When he moved to North London, he sent me to my current athletics club, Piotr Spas in Tooting."

Sabine Coates: becoming a junior doctor in the pandemic

When the pandemic struck last year, Sabine Coates (OE2007-14), was a final year medical student at Bristol University. The scale of the crisis and the pressure it put on the NHS meant that Sabine and many others in her cohort graduated six months early to join the frontline of the fight against Covid-19.

Here, she tells us about her journey to become a junior doctor and her experience of starting work during a national healthcare crisis.

Did you always know you wanted to go into medicine?

Not at all! Up until the end of GCSEs, I thought I wanted to go into media and be an artistic director or producer. I never felt I was clever enough to even consider going in to medicine.

The real turning point for me was my mum who at the time had done an Access course and was in her first year studying midwifery. Not only was I immensely

proud of her, but I found the content fascinating. I considered midwifery but realised I was eager to learn more about medicine and surgery as a whole with a greater understanding of the science behind decisions, knowing that whichever area I found most fascinating there would be a speciality for me.

Ms Aitken-Burt co-authors History textbooks



Those of you who kindly completed our survey on History curricula will remember History and Politics teacher, Ms Aitken-Burt, who is now co-authoring a series of new History textbooks with Collins.

Ms Aitken-Burt has been commissioned by Collins to co-author a new series of KS3 History textbooks for publication in 2022. This follows a speech she made last year at the West London Free School History Conference about rigour, diversity and inclusion in KS3 History curricula.

The current editions of <u>Collins' 'Knowing History'</u> will be revised and doubled in size to include a more global focus covering areas as varied as the Aztecs, Mongols, Mughals, Ottomans, Chinese dynasties, Islamic caliphates, African kingdoms and European imperialism. Ms Aitken-Burt will be writing multiple units across the four textbooks. She is also helping to increase representation of female characters and highlight language sensitivities throughout the text.

Ms Aitken-Burt's interest in global history stems from a degree in Classical Archaeology and Ancient History from Oxford University and as a practicing archaeologist. These new textbooks aim to give a solid academic grounding, improve literacy and spark younger pupils' interest in the history of the world.

He holds a Master's Degree in Chemistry and in Research (Ultra Precision), studies next generation sustainable materials and holds an NUS Green Impact Challenge Student Leadership Award."

Charlie last visited Emanuel back in 2019 to lead a talk on his PhD subject on photonics in nature and producing weavable photonic fibres which can be used in a wide variety of applications and industries.

OE Laurie Taylor returns for Politics talk

Laurie Taylor (OE1964-69), now semi-retired and living in Devon, attended Emanuel School in the 1960s when it was a grammar school. More than 50 years on, he entered a virtual classroom to discuss voting reform with students.

Laurie told us, "After reading that the school had staged its own in-house learning about elections around the time of the last General Election, I wanted to share my knowledge and passion for voting reform

with today's politics students. It's an issue which is close to my heart, having campaigned for Proportional Representation for Westminster elections for more than 40 years now.

I'm also a member of the national <u>Make Votes Matter</u> campaign group and have given crossparty talks to other schools in the area where I now live. But going back to my old school to help bring the curriculum to life seemed important, especially in the run up to elections for London Mayor and to the London Assembly. If I'd had the chance to hear first-hand from someone who campaigns on these sorts of issues when I was at school, it would have been an experience that would have stayed with me for a very long time."

As a pupil, Roy was the scorer for the 1st XI team and was a talented athlete and cross country runner. After studying Geography at university, he returned to Emanuel to teach between 1966 and 1968. Roy later became a highly distinguished geographer, working in universities and writing many books on subjects such as soil erosion. We also have the 'Morgan Cup' in the archive, a running trophy which was awarded to the winner of the 'Christmas Handicap' and was named after Roy.
