National recognition for outreach

We are thrilled to have won the Independent Schools of the Year 2021 community outreach category. The award recognises our creative approach to supporting our primary school partners throughout the pandemic with our Primary Ambitions programme. Primary Ambitions unites Year 6 pupils from 18 local state schools with a high proportion of free school meals with Emanuel Lower Sixth students every Friday from 2.00pm to 3.00pm. Our Lower Sixth students teach a variety of subjects to groups of 15 Year 6 pupils on our school site. The modules taught cover subjects in the arts, language, literature, politics, science, technology, maths and sport with 20 different options for primary schools to choose from. The emphasis is on our pupils running each session, enabling them to develop leadership, coaching and mentoring skills as well as further develop confidence, empathy, kindness and respect for those from different backgrounds.



The challenges posed by Covid-19 meant our partners needed our support more than ever. Given partner schools were unable to come on site, our pupils embraced the challenge and developed Primary Ambitions 'Lessons-in-a-box' to deliver to our partner schools. They prepared lesson plans, presentations, group and individual activities, how-to videos, and materials. With the complexities of primary school teaching over the pandemic, providing opportunities for enrichment was invaluable.

Goddard Lecture: Animate Materials - A Sustainable Future

Professor Mark Miodownik (OE1982-87) delivered the Autumn 2021 Goddard Lecture in the Hampden Hall this term. The Goddard lectures offer pupils an opportunity to hear from individuals who are expert in their field, aiming to engender a high level of academic and professional

engagement from pupils, promoting bright minds, innovative thinking and gritty determination. They are named after one of our most distinguished alumni, Professor Peter Goddard, CBE FRS, who remains a good friend to Emanuel School. He is a mathematical physicist who works in string theory and conformal field theory. Pupils Annabel and Teddy reviewed the lecture:

Professor Miodownik spoke with great enthusiasm about the way in which the human relationship with materials has changed over time. He looked toward a future when buildings would behave like trees, or our skin, and have the ability to heal. He explained how his team are already trialling the use of additives containing bacteria and starch into concrete structures, like bridges and roads, that are able to regenerate calcium carbonate when exposed to the air. Overall we were taken by his great passion for science and sustainability.

Remembrance Day and the Battle of Britain OEs

We held our Remembrance Day Service in the Chapel on 11 November to honour more than 250 Old Emanuels and staff who lost their lives in the first and second world wars and the 1700 who served. Tony Jones, our school Archivist, ran a number of Remembrance Day posts on Facebook

(@EmanuelSchoolAlumni) including one about the five OEs who fought in The Battle of Britain over British skies during the summer and autumn of 1940 when most of Europe had surrendered to Hitler. The main German objective, after the successful occupation of France, was to destroy the RAF and gain air superiority over the UK, leading to potential invasion. Its failure was seen as one of the first major turning points of the war and Germany realised there would be no easy victory over Britain and certainly no surrender.

Over 3000 pilots fought in this seven-month aerial conflict. They are now known as 'The Few' and it is incredible that five attended Emanuel, a statistic which is only higher in the very big public schools. Daniel Fulcher: Volunteering with Kambala Cares

At the beginning of the year, we asked OEs to let us know about volunteering they had been doing during the Covid pandemic. Daniel Fulcher (OE 1996-2001) let us know

From October 2020, I have been helping deliver meals on wheels with the Kambala Cares group, which was formed 4 years ago by the Kambala Estate Residents Association in central Battersea. From 16 March 2020 the group has provided outreach during lockdown to elderly and disabled people in the larger Wandsworth area to meet demand from care home residents and other community members with a diverse range of support needs.

As a group we deliver hot meals three days a week to more than 100 vulnerable adults in Wandsworth and bring them food boxes with additional essential items on a bi-monthly basis.

The team won the Team London Awards out of 32 boroughs at City Hall in 2018 and are currently working with Age UK Wandsworth, Katherine Low Settlement, Springfield Hospital recovery CMHT, Leonard Cheshire disabled charity, SENTalk children and families with Autism and ADHD.

The Kambala Cares Project is in the process of registering as a charity organisation and all donations are more than welcome to continue the good work being carried out.
